MICROGRANT PURPOSE

Nonprofits were asked to submit proposals that demonstrate the effectiveness in engaging youth who play integral roles in these nonprofits.

This is a competitive round of grant funding of up to \$2,000. Grant funds may be used to help develop and formalize your youth board; provide professional development to teen advisors (such as attending a grant writing class or nonprofit conference or retreat); sponsor a special youth-led project; provide challenge grant funding for a youth board fundraising activity; or another project that will engage youth and advance their formal roles within the organization. We encouraged, but did not require, youth to work with staff on completing this application.
