



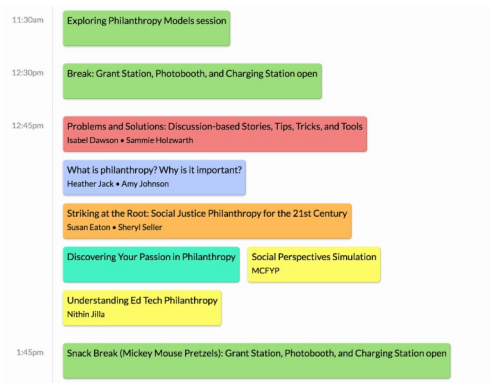

**Meet Three Youth Philanthropists:
[Leadership Team Members Gordon Phung, Catherine Maeve](#)**

Gorey, and Jonah Gomez

Growing up, **Gordon Phung** was affected by social issues—he just didn't know it. It wasn't until his freshman year of high school when he joined [Youth Funding Youth Ideas](#) (YFYI)—a San Francisco-based youth philanthropy program that funds \$100,000 of youth-led community projects annually—when Phung learned the technicalities of the gentrification and immigration injustices his family has endured for years.



The 18-year-old senior at Galileo Academy of Science and Technology has been a member of YFYI for four years, and now serves as the Youth Evaluator. Though he will be graduating high school and moving away soon, he isn't in any rush to leave. **"I'm really sad that this is probably my last year in YFYI because I'm going to college soon," Phung said. He did, however, add a hopeful note: "I do seek to continue my social justice work."**

YFYI's calendar year is divided into three fiscal parts—three grant cycles. Phung spoke of one project that YFYI has funded ... [\(Read Gordon's full profile here.\)](#)



Catherine Maeve Gorey wants to be involved in giving for the rest of her life. The 16-year-old junior at Darien High School in Darien, CT has been engaged in the [Youth Community Fund of Darien](#) and the [Youth Philanthropy Connect Leadership Team](#) for the past year.

The Youth Community Fund of Darien's goal is to expose local high school students to leadership, community service, and philanthropic opportunities. According to the Fund's website, "These students pursue volunteering opportunities, research needs, review grant applications and award \$5,000 in grant money to nonprofits."

A single year on the Fund runs from the fall to the spring—from visiting and researching nonprofits during the fall and winter months, to deliberating in the spring. When **Jonah Gomez** was 7 years old, he noticed a homeless man sitting outside of a restaurant that he and his family were leaving. Jonah gave the man all of his family's leftovers. That moment ignited in him a passion for giving to those less fortunate.

Jonah is currently a seventh grader at the Pacific Collegiate School in Santa Cruz, CA. **He has served on the [Frieda C. Fox Family Foundation's Junior Board](#) for the past year and is one of the newest members of the [Leadership Team for Youth Philanthropy Connect](#).**

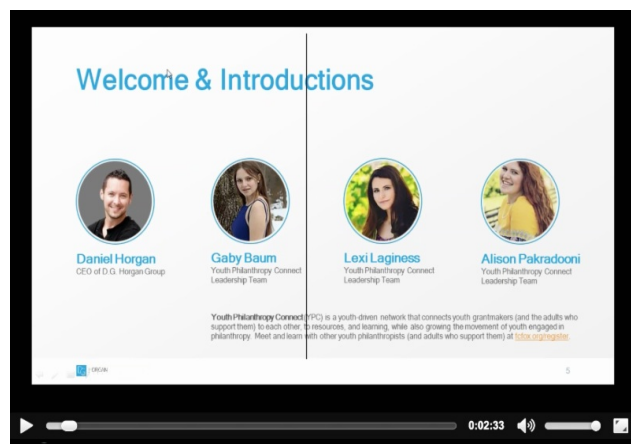
"I'm able to transfer from what I've learn with YPC into my foundation, and start to be more a part of our annual meetings,"

A 4-Part Webinar Series on Youth Engagement

[The Youth Philanthropy Initiative of Indiana](#) has produced a new webinar series that gives local and national experts a platform to discuss topics of service learning and project-based volunteerism, youth grantmaking, youth leadership, and tips for engaging youth in philanthropy.

YPII's 4-pillar model—serving, giving, leading, and engaging—is utilized to explain the progression youth take from engaging in their families to engaging in their wider communities.

Announcing the Jewish Teen Funders Network Director

Briana Holtzman has been appointed the new director of the Jewish Teen Funders Network! Briana has been the program director of JTFN's Foundation Board Incubator for the past two years, helping cities around the world launch high investment, community-wide Jewish teen foundations. The upcoming Jewish Teen Philanthropy Summit this June will serve as a great opportunity to meet Briana!

The Winner of the \$10,000 Sillerman Prize is ... Allow Good!

Allow Good is a nonprofit that practices participatory decision-making and encourages youth philanthropy among high school students to create the next generation of philanthropists and changemakers. Participants in the class learn about hardships facing communities where they live and other communities across the country, and then replicate the philanthropic process to give funds to an organization of their choice.

The two runner-ups and recipients of \$2,500 each are Effective Altruists at UC Berkley and the University of Rhode Island Student Philanthropy Council. Three student groups received honorable mention: Towson University's Presidential Ambassadors, Loras College's Dance Marathon, and Oklahoma State University's Student Foundation.

Learning by Giving students distributed \$150,000 to local non profits, just last semester alone!

Over the months, more than 40 community nonprofits were awarded money, and more than 200 students had a hand in the philanthropic process! Check out the Grant Map to the right to see where all of the grants were distributed!

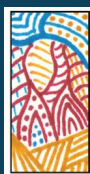
